







| KNOWN HERITAGE LISTINGS: |
| Fairley was a small group of houses, since totally demolished. An orthophotomap shows the Fairley site as cleared patches of land amongst bush, at the western end of Fairley Road, just north of the site of the former Seaham No.2 Colliery. The site was not inspected, due to access problems following the construction of the new freeway which cuts across Fairley Road. A sketch map of the Fairley subdivision (TGR p.253) shows ten streets and more than 100 house sites. |
| INTERPRETATION: None. If relics of village or mine worth interpreting still exist, they are cut off from West Wallsend by the freeway. If the area is developed, some interpretation should be provided. |
| CONSERVATION ACTIVITY: Inspect the site to determine the extent of remaining physical evidence, if any. and to assess the need for recording or other archaeological investigation. |
| PRESENT USE: Disused land. We did not investigate whether the subdivision titles still exist, or who holds them. |
| HISTORICAL NOTES: When Seaham No.2 Colliery started in 1904/05, with manager Mr Fairley, the Company subdivided adjacent land for a town for its miners, so the men could live close to the job instead of walking a long distance. Only a few scattered houses were built. Since the mine closed in 1945, all houses have been demolished and Fairley has physically ceased to exist. |
