West Wallsend is in the north-west sector of the PHYSICAL CHARACTERISTICS City of Lake Macquarie, facing Sugarloaf Range to Townscape or Landscape Features: the west. The town is highly developed, but has changed little in development density since 1930 & has barely stepped outside its 1900 bounds.

It has a character clearly influenced by its association with an historic colliery, & strengthened by a picturesque setting on a long hillside above the colliery, with the brooding presence of Mt Sugarloaf in the background. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE: West Wallsend typifies the way the establishment & growth of towns, population & commerce in the Hunter were all closely linked to the growth of the coal mining industry. It is an archetype of a 19C mining town, planned & developed by a mining company to house its own miners, in an area otherwise too remote to attract miners. It was a successful mining town, large enough to support many commercial & community services, & becoming the centre for other villages in the district. It still retains its vitality as a town & its role as district centre, 68 years after its Colliery closed. Despite isolated intrusions of modern buildings, West Wallsend has retained its original style of a prosperous mining town, with rows of simple steeproofed miners' cottages, interspersed with a few grander community buildings.

DESCRIPTION

West Wallsend township is in the north-west sector of the City of Lake Macquarie, Parish of Teralba. Geographically, it is within the catchment area of Cockle Creek. The town is built on sloping land, facing mainly to the west or south, & in view of Mt Sugarloaf, a dominating presence. The character of West Wallsend has been developed primarily through its history as a coal mining town & as a de facto regional centre, served by (and helped in its self sufficiency by) its own passenger-train & steam-tram transport systems.

Although entirely dependent for its growth on the operation of the coal mines. and without any significant agricultural infrastructure (unlike many of the Hunter Valley towns), West Wallsend has resisted acquiring the dependant character of company towns like Queenstown or Mt Morgan. This is partly due to the more democratic and locally connected nature of the colliery companies (in comparison to Welsh or Kentucky models, or even the big Australian companies of the time).

The character and growth of the town were due also to the West Wallsend centred transport systems which provided a strong link with the outer world. especially the culture and commerce of Newcastle and Sydney, and helped West Wallsend overcome its physical isolation. For example, the extraordinary development of the West Wallsend Co-operative Society Ltd. into a successful multi-faceted semi-industrial business, involved in manufacturing, packing, wholesaling and retailing goods for a wide area, and for a clientele far beyond the local mine workers, would hardly have been possible without the ease of goods transport into and out of the centre.

The town was unusually close knit, with a community feeling based on the collieries (which directly or indirectly provided everyone's employment then) and which seemed to transcend class and religious barriers. The strong community feeling is still noticeable today in conversations with townspeople, many of whom show considerable knowledge of and interest in their local history and its physical manifestations.

In fact, the physical manifestations of its history encompass the whole town. Like many other mining towns, West Wallsend did not grow naturally, but was wholly based on an artificial subdivision plan devised by the mining company. However, West Wallsend must be one of few towns of similar age and type which had practically every block in the original subdivision sold and built on in its first twenty years, and which has retained its form and vitality after its parent mine closed. The town is remarkably coherent in its architecture, with the steep pitched hipped roofs of the miners' cottages producing the dominant form, surrounding and pulling together the cluster of larger and more varied buildings in the business, church and school centre, and clearly reflecting the coherent spirit of the community.

Very few houses have been added to the main subdivision since the 1920s, and although many of the houses have been altered to some extent (often through the use of "Hardiplank" cladding and aluminium windows, and sometimes with tiled roofs), their basic and consistent historic form is unchanged.

HISTORY

During the period 1863 to 1884, a total of 2,953 acres of land in the Parish of Teralba was bought or selected by a group of people (Mary, Mary P, Henry & George Lane, Garrett, Greville, & Humphrey) in varying parcels at different times, & probably independently. These people formed the "Teralba Trust" & sold the land soon after to JRM Robertson & RB Wallace, who passed it on to the West Wallsend Coal Co. Ltd. a few days after the company was formed in 1885. A Mr Henry Lane is listed as a shareholder in the coal company.

The company soon had a town surveyed close to the shaft they were sinking. The first subdivision was registered on 17th April 1886 (Deposited Plan 2252). All lots were a 1/4 acre, with 66 feet frontage, large when compared with Sydney, & extraordinarily generous when compared to the miners' experience in Britain. At an auction on 12th August 1887, a number of lots were sold in what became the central business district of the town. The first coal was extracted early in 1888, & the official opening of the mine on July 4th also marked the introduction of a passenger service on the new Railway to the town. Another land sale was held on 23rd July 1888. It was reported that "from 116 to 120 lots out of 200 were disposed of ... & with one or two exceptions, to single lot buyers". A second extended subdivision was registered 16 Aug 1888.

By September 1888 the Company had a major strike, & thought to solve it by hiring 80 labourers in Sydney to work the mine. Just 23 of the 80 men actually went to West Wallsend, arriving in a special train. The 23 men were protected by a police magistrate, a police inspector, 30 policemen, & an army lieutenant with 50 soldiers from the Newcastle force, complete with machine gun. The company built a row of huts along the north side of Wilson Street, which was known locally as "Scab Row". These huts were soon demolished after the miners went back to work (apparently on their own conditions).

In 1895 the Caledonian Coal Co took over the West Wallsend Colliery, & before long the output & workforce had doubled. The town grew quickly, & by 1910, when the steam tram started, the town had about 6000 inhabitants, two schools, a strong football club (soccer), a thriving Co-operative Society, a cemetery, several suburbs (Mafeking, Ladysmith, Holmesville), the necessary churches, a School of Arts, a Masonic Institute, a grand Post Office, a Railway Station, a reticulated water supply from the Hunter system, & at least 5 hotels.

In 1911 there was an outdoor cinema, with an electric generator which supplied neighbouring businesses in Carrington St. with lighting. Not long after, the Coal Co. supplied power to the whole town from generators at the mine.

The community thrived for many years, weathering closure of West Wallsend Mine in 1923, because the men could move to other local mines, or catch a tram to work elsewhere. In 1929 it was much harder, with a mine lockout that began on 1st March. By the time the lockout finished 14 months later, the Depression had started, & work in the mines or any other work became scarce. By 1935, men of the town were glad to get Government work, building roads. Many were sent south, but one gang built a "Golden Mile" of sandstone kerbing & guttering in Withers Street. It is said to be still in use.

West Wallsend's streets were sealed in the 1960s, & the town was connected to a sewerage system in 1964 to 1965. In 1964 the Co-op was wound up. Most of the Stores buildings remained in use as individually operated shops, & continue to reflect the important place in the community that the Co-op. had.

DESCRIPTION

West Wallsend No.1 was formerly a major coal mine, with advanced equipment & materials handling methods. The buildings & machinery have been removed, but there remains much clearly visible evidence of the layout of the surface workings of the mine. The evidence includes large concrete mounting blocks for winding, ventilating & lighting machinery, concrete floor slabs, a sunken area with piers (probably the boiler house), a large engine pond (which held water for the boilers), an array of tall brick piers from a wagon-filling facility. a broad curved cutting for the rail line from Cockle Creek, and a broad flat embankment for the line which continued on to Seaham No.1. At a safe distance, there is a small arch-roofed brick maagazine, for storing explosives.

The focal point of the group is a concrete-capped shaft surmounted by the bottom half of a steel head-frame. The headframe was complete until several years ago, when the upper half was oxy-cut off and re-erected at a short-lived mining museum at Freeman's Waterholes. The other displays have been removed from Freeman's, but the partial headframe remains, set in concrete.

The West Wallsend No.1 Colliery is located close to the north-west side of West Wallsend township, with one side of the mine site adjoining the back fence of houses in Wilson Street. The open land slopes gently down from Wilson Street to the mine, which is on flatter land near to a confluence of creeks. To the south-west is the soccer field, Johnson Park. North & north-east, the land rises towards Seahampton. Around the site is the remains of a typical colliery fence, with condemned steel hoisting cable strung between posts.

HISTORY

The West Wallsend Coal Co was established in 1885, & began sinking its shafts in 1885/86. The colliery was equipped with a then very modern coal & wagon handling system, with full coal skips steam-hauled to the top of an all-steel headframe (reported to be the first in Australia), then running to coal boxes & back to the headframe by gravity. The mine began producing in 1888, worked by 200-250 men, with output of 50-80,000 tons per year. Industrial disputes hampered production, and at one time led to armed troops guarding non-union labour working the mine, while unionists picketed outside.

Caledonian Coal Co took over the West Wallsend Colliery (and the Killingworth or West Wallsend Extended Colliery) in 1895. The new owner soon doubled the workforce and the output of the West Wallsend Colliery. Despite the mechanised skip handling, the coal was won by hand, without mechanical coal cutters. This was said to be a gassy mine, with methane or "firedamp" causing several minor fires, but the mine had no major explosion. The mine was in full production in 1921, with 450 men producing 1000 tons per day, but output slumped in 1922/23, and the colliery ceased operation in 1923. Despite hopes of re-opening, production did not resume, and the machinery was scrapped in the early 1940s.

In 1912, the owners (or their name) had changed to Caledonian Collieries Ltd. This company owned West Walsend Colliery up to its closure in 1923, & for many years beyond when it was a non-operating mine. In 1961, Caledonian Collieries amalgamated with the previously amalgamated J & A Brown & Abermain Seaham Collieries, to form Coal & Allied, which then owned almost all collieries in the district. Some of the closed C & A mines, including West Wallsend (No.1) were recently bought by BHP.

RECOMMENDATIONS

West Wallsend Colliery is an archaeological site of very high potential for interesting interpretation in an attractive open park-like setting, with the heritage site as its centre. Ruins such as these are a rare resource. Lambton Colliery has the only intact 19th Century colliery buildings in the region. The West Wallsend ruins would be the most extensive 19th Century colliery ruins in the region.

The colliery site (including surface works, railway cutting & embankment, pond, & hoisting cable fence), could very well be converted into a public recreation park, with interpretation of the mine as an easily accessible & highly visible focal point in an industrial heritage trail. It would thus become a valuable community asset.

Funding should be sought for a comprehensive archaeological study & management plan for the site. The study should include mapping & recording the obvious structures & relics, carrying out an archaeological investigation of the colliery site & the railway & making recommendations for the conservation of surviving relics & evidence, & for public interpretation & use of the site.

An essential part of this project would be to recover the top half of the important steel headframe from Freeman's Waterholes, and re-erect it on top of the half-headframe still at West Wallsend, with original or reconstructed back-stays. Organisations such as the Institution of Engineers Heritage Committee, the Newcastle Regional Museum, the Engineering Faculties of the Universities of Newcastle & NSW could be recruited in the project & possibly local engineering firms could be approached to contribute.













DESCRIPTION

The photograph on the first page of this inventory entry (Doring Neg.302.33) shows all extant former West Wallsend Co-op buildings except for three sites. These are the Produce Store (Doring Neg. 302.24) hidden behind the right hand shopfront, the former Lubritorium, on the east side of Withers Street (not in inventory), & the former shop at No.47 Carrington Street (WW-11). Buildings shown in the photo (Doring Neg.302.33) occupy Lots 8 & 9, Section "A", & are (from right to left):

- * Former Butchery (c1910/14), now two shops with a doctor's surgery occupying the righthand shop.
- * Bank of 3 shops (1927), including a Pharmacy on the corner of Carrington & Withers Street, and two shops facing Withers St.
- * Bank of 5 shops (1927), facing Withers Street
- * First brick building put up by the Co-op (1906) for drapery, millinery etc. downstairs & Workshop upstairs, on the corner of Withers St. & Brown St.

Further descriptions of Co-op buildings are included in captions to the photos below. A brief account of the history of the Co-op., & a Statement of Significance are on the following pages. Some Recommendations are on the the bottom of page two of this inventory entry, with the Significance rating.

HISTORY

The West Wallsend Co-operative Society Limited was founded in 1891, with 22 members & share capital of £63. Its first commercial venture was the leasing of a shop (still existing) & adjoining house at 47 Carrington Street, opposite the Post Office. The first Manager, Edward Stobbs, lived in the house. Soon the Co-op outgrew the small shop and built larger premises on the east side of Withers Street where the Service Station is now (opposite the still extant Co-op buildings). In 1896 the first Manager left, to set up his own business in opposition to the Co-op., but nevertheless the Co-op continued to thrive.

There appears to have been an almost continuous building programme, with extensions to the original building, and a number of sheds and stables added nearby. By 1899 the Co-op had 1044 Store members (or shareholders) in population of around 6000. The dividend rate was more than 2 shillings in the pound (ie. 10%) and the management had saved up large reserve funds.

J.D. Thomas's Butcher Shop on the corner of Carrington Street and Withers Street was bought by the Co-op in 1905, together with the shop manager's residence behind the butcher shop on Withers Street (both thought to have been on Lot 8 Section "A"). It is probable that the Co-op bought Lot 9, Section "A", at the same time, as it was on this lot that the two-storey first brick building was opened in 1906. It consisted of two large shops downstairs, housing Drapery, Millinery, Tailoring etc. departments, and a lineshaft equipped Workshop upstairs.

It is thought that the Co-op bought Lot 7, facing Carrington Street, soon after 1906, and it is probable that the Produce Store on this site was the second brick building to be built by the Co-op.

HISTORY (Continued)

At some time around 1910 to 1915, a large new Shop was built on Lot 7, between the Produce Store and Thomas's shop. The initial use of this building is not certain, but as the Butchery business was expanding, it is possible that the Butchering business was transferred from Thomas's shop immediately. The former Thomas's Butcher Shop was eventually demolished, but probably not until it was replaced by the existing corner block in 1927. A photograph dated c1926 (NMtS Bk 3 p.75) shows Thomas's shop still in situ.

The Co-operative was a large & complex organisation by 1926, and the 1927 building programme involved construction of 8 large shops, under 4 roofs. Extensive refrigerated coolroom facilities were installed behind the Butchery, & the interior was tiled & fitted with marble topped counters. (The Butchery had 11 staff in 1926, & a slaughterhouse & yards somewhere in Estelville.) The new buildings were opened on 26th Feb 1927. A plaque on the wall of the building in Withers Street commemorates the occasion, and notes that the buildings were designed by Architect J.W. Oldham, and built by A. Bates.

By the 1930s, even during the Depression, the Co-operative Society had over 40 people on the staff, & at various times throughout its history had a huge variety of departments, including Produce, Grocery, Bakery, Butchering, Dairy Greengroceries, Refreshment Rooms, Pastrycooking, Pharmacy, Dental & Optical services, Insurance, Newspapers, Drapery, Dressmaking, Tailoring, Millinery, Furnishings, Explosives, Boots and Shoes, Boot Repair, Hardware, Ironmongery, Crockery, Blacksmithing, Saddlery, Coach-building, Wholesale, and a Motor Garage (Lubritorium). The Lubritorium was a venture of the 1950s. The Society started with stables for 26 horses, and later had a fleet of vans.

The West Wallsend Co-operative Society Ltd. developed into a multi-faceted semi-industrial business, manufacturing & packing goods for a wide area, including Minmi, Cessnock & around the Lake. It opened branches at Belmont & Swansea & took over bakeries at Boolaroo & Wallsend. Co-op. Society business declined in the 1950s, and the Stores ceased trading on 11th October 1964.

SIGNIFICANCE

A local co-operative enterprise, well run & very successful, providing good quality & service to customers, & healthy financial returns to members, & which set a standard that other businesses or co-operatives tried to match. The Co-op had a major beneficial influence on the life of the town & district. It provided goods & services to improve the life & comfort of its customers. It provided much of the district's non-mining employment, in shops & in workshops, butcheries, bakeries etc which made goods for the shops. Although based in West Wallsend, it served a much wider area, through branch outlets, or through remote customers travelling to West Wallsend to shop. Thus it helped to make West Wallsend township the centre of the local district.

The Co-op supported its shareholders/customers with credit through the lean years of the Depression and during prolonged industrial disputes, earning the gratitude and loyalty of the local community and easing much of the bitterness which might otherwise have arisen.

The Co-op buildings group is a very strong architectural element (possibly the strongest) in the heart of West Wallsend. The Co-operative Stores Group comprises the most distinctive and best-known of all the town's buildings.



BOTTOM: (74?) Carrington St, West Wallsend (Lot 7 Sect.E). Comprises 2 shops facing Carrington St., east of Produce Store. Formerly Co-op Butchery, now two shops, Doctor's Surgery on right. Construction probably c1910/14. Building has ornate brick parapet, in "Federation Free Style" heavily decorated in popular contrasting red brick & stucco, with dentilation, pilasters etc. now picked out in white paint. Large timber trusses in gable roof were exposed, but now are covered by ceilings. In c1927 interior was "renovated" with extensive white & (?) blue tiling on walls, marble topped tables & counters. Some of the fine tiling may survive. Said to be a large (once refrigerated) coolroom at the back. Corner pharmacy at left is part of two 1927 buildings, designed to complement the butchery & the 1906 Store down the hill. (Doring Neg.302.25)

Reinstatement of this or similar paving material should be considered.

BOTTOM: S-W Cnr Carrington & Withers St. Pharmacy on corner & lawn mower shop & variety shop on Withers St. (part Lot 8 Sect.E). Built 1927. Original use not known. Former site of J.D.Thomas's Butcher Shop (corner) & Manager's Residence (Withers St.). These were demolished after c1926 (see photo NMtS Bk 3 p.75). Modern clock replaces a round faced clock. This building is designed to be complementary to & sympathetic with the c1914 Butchery in Carrington St. & the 1906 Co-op building on Withers & Brown Sts. A similar combination of stucco dentilation, sunbursts & "blood & bandages" patterning is carried out in darker brick. Shop fronts differ from the older buildings in the use of a typical late 1920s lead-lighting feature around the tops of the windows. The 1927 shops were designed by Architect J.W. Oldham, & built by A. Bates. (Doring Neg.302.32)

(shops 8, 7, 6, 5, 4). These shop fronts and ornamental facades are virtually identical to the Pharmacy and two shops at the Carrington St. corner of Withers St (shops 1, 2, 3). The 1927 shops were designed by Architect J.W. Oldham, and built by A. Bates. (Doring Neg.305.06)

BOTTOM: Mitre 10 Hardware Store, (shop 4) Withers St. This shop is the uphill end of a group of five (1927) shops next to the 1906 building. Original use not known, ornamental facade signage could have been painted over. Interior has decorative pressed metal ceiling. Other shops in group have plain fibrous plaster panels. Lead lighting & shopfront joinery is the same as that of the Pharmacy group of buildings. (Doring Neg.303.05)







HISTORY

The school was founded in 1889, with a substantial classroom block, and a separate Schoolteachers Residence, both facing north on Brown Street, and both a short distance from the town centre. The first addition was a wing added on the west end of the classroom block in 1899. This again was added to on the south a few years later, in 1903 or 1904. The next major addition is the most prominent building on the school site, built in 1907 across the east end of the original building. The last major building on the site was the Infants School, completed in 1913. The growth of the school reflected the rapid growth of population in the town, levelling off at about the time the town's population levelled off at somewhere above 6000. Other notes on the history of the School are included in the captions to individual photographs.

PHOTOGRAPH: West Wallsend Public School, cnr Brown Street and Withers Street. Shows the east elevation and part of the north elevation of the east wing added to the original (1889) School building in 1907. Built by Mr S. O'Brien for £1810. A drawing is reproduced in NMtS Bk.3 p.17. It is signed by George McRae, (for?) Government Architect (McRae was designer of the Queen Victoria Building in Sydney). The style and construction has remained similar to the earlier buildings, with subtle changes in eaves detailing etc., and a little added stucco decoration, providing the key to the change from Victorian to Federation style. This is particularly noticeable in the photo (303-24). The plan layout has been modernised, with smaller class rooms reflecting changes in education practice. The roomy basement may have been used for storage, assembly or wet weather play areas. Basement windows appear to have been altered. Note the Miner's Memorial (see photo 303-13 on WW-32 for detail) in the corner of the school grounds. The school community takes a great interest in local (Doring Neg. 305.11) history.

Federation Arts & Crafts style is cumbersome, resolving an up-to-date plan form (6 classrooms around a large hall) with a complex arrangement of small gables requiring inefficient box gutters, & resulting in a forbidding & overbearing aspect. CITY OF LAKE MACQUARIE HERITAGE STUDY ITEM No. WW - 46 NAME/IDENTITY MOUNT SUGARLOAF and the SUGARLOAF RANGE KNOWN HERITAGE LISTINGS: Mt Sugarloaf is the high point on Sugarloaf Range, PHYSICAL CHARACTERISTICS which forms a north & west wall to the Lake catchment The ridge is covered with dense scrub, but the peak is a bald rock with a lookout (& steel access steps donated by BHP). Below the lookout are car parks & picnic areas, reached via Sugarloaf Range Road which runs along the top of the ridge for the length of the Range. Next to the peak, are TV broadcast or microwave communication towers with associated buildings. The peak offers extensive views to all points including Newcastle DESCRIPTION: & the ocean. The Range Road has panoramic views to the Lake. Viewed from the north of Lake Macquarie, Mt Sugarloaf is the most dominant natural feature & provides a very definite visual boundary for people living there. The mountain also seems to have an ever-watching and unifying presence, as shown in the title of the "'Neath Mount Sugarloaf" series of local history books. DESCRIPTION

Mount Sugarloaf No.1 Colliery is located at two levels on a steep hillside, on the south face of Sugarloaf Range. Coal was extracted at the upper level, from three horizontal tunnels (adits) driven into the cliff face. The coal was taken to a lower level area below the cliff face, to be screened and loaded into motor lorries which carted the coal to the nearest working rail line, at West Wallsend Extended Colliery, Killingworth.

All buildings and equipment have been removed. A levelled earth working platform outside the tunnels still exists, but the tunnel entrances have been roughly covered by earth piled-up against the cliff face. A short external concrete tunnel shielding the main entrance is partially buried, but is still visible. There are reportedly remnants of walls and concrete footings in the lower area (but not inspected by us).

The main access to the site is via the rough dirt road running south towards Killingworth, but now cut by the freeway works. There is also a short very steep broken bitumen road from the upper (adit) level up to Sugarloaf Range Road. Local walkers and trail-bike riders often use these roads to visit the site for recreational use. There is a water tank beside the bitumen acces road, and three concrete saddles beside Suggarloaf Range Road which held an old (colliery?) boiler used as a water tank (since removed).

HISTORY

In 1885, a small un-named tunnel (not Holmes' Tunnel) was dug into the south face of the Sugarloaf Range, to mine an outcrop of the Great Northern Seam. The coal was used to fire boilers for the sinking of shafts at West Wallsend and Monkwearmouth (Seaham No.1) collieries, until those shafts reached their own seams. The 1885 Mount Sugarloaf tunnel was then abandoned until 1949, when four local men in partnership obtained a lease on the site from Caledonian Coal Co and began mining the old tunnel. In 1953 the mine passed to Mount Sugarloaf Collieries Pty Ltd, which is said to have been formed by the original partners.

The M.S.Co. mined the original tunnel, then dug at least two further horizontal new tunnels (or adits) after the first was worked out. A fourth tunnel was started but abandoned. The mine machinery, including horizontal conveyors to bring out the coal, was powered by electricity from the Cockle Creek Power Station.

Mount Sugarloaf Colliery was unusual in this district, in that it was worked by tunnels (or adits) driven horizontally into a coal seam in the cliff face, without needing deep vertical shafts.

The mine closed in 1978, after producing 2 million tons of coal. The tunnel entrances were "sealed" by bulldozing earth up aginst the cliff face to cover them (but the earth has since settled away from the cliff, leaving a gap which could be dangerous for small children). The "Sugarloaf Colliery" sign from above the main entrance was re-erected at the West Wallsend Public School, with a memorial plaque with the names of men who had been killed in the district's mines. (See WW-32). A colliery known as Mount Sugarloaf No.2 was opened on the north face of Sugarloaf Range, but is not relevant to this study as it is outside the City of Lake Macquarie.



More families came as coal mining began, to work in the mines or supply them with pit timber, but O'Donnelltown remained a small settlement. Area of open ground or regrowth bush, south of the rubbish tip/brickworks & southwest of Slatey Creek, is possibly the site of Mafeking, & may have relics of a street or houses. Reynolds' Brickworks: Thomas Reynolds set up a brickworks (date not known), south of West Wallsend Cemetery, to make bricks for the mines. Reynolds' bricks were also used in many house chimneys & to build the West Wallsend PO. Mafeking is said to have been a hamlet of 6 or 7 houses, west of Slatey (or Flaggy) Creek, close to Reynolds Brickworks, or near the headwaters of Slatey Creek. Named after the Relief of Mafeking in 1900. Not found on any of maps seen, so probably was an informal collection of makeshift cottages (one of them is said to have been a bag house), built by renters or squatters. INTERPRETATION: CONSERVATION ACTIVITY: abandoned PRESENT USE: One of Reynolds' sons lived in Mafeking near the brickworks, HISTORICAL NOTES: to be close to the clamps (or kilns?) at night. The brickyard closed in 1909, and eventually the clay pit was filled in after it became the West Wallsend rubbish tip. Not known when Mafeking was deserted. REFERENCES: . RECOMMENDATION: Positively identify the location of Mafeking settlement and of Reynolds' Brickworks. Make preliminary historical archaeological assessments of the sites, then decide whether or not a detailed dig is warranted. Most if not all physical evidence of the brickworks has probably been destroyed.
