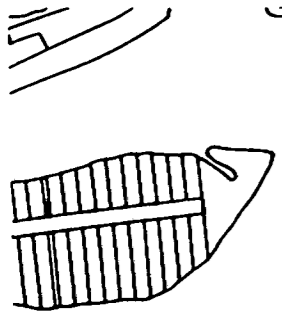

It is not far across the water from the mouth of Dora Creek. Its principal feature is a large number of Norfolk Island Pine trees. | <p><b>HISTORICAL NOTES:</b> The trees are said to have been planted in about 1920 by Alfred Sara, who lived alone on the Point in a slab house. There may be traces of the slab house still in existence.
