The people are among the most friendly he has met anywhere and very easy to get along with. Also, that they obviously take every advantage of the wonderful climatic conditions which they enjoy, by getting out of doors as much as possible.

The scenic beauty and grandeur of the Blue Mountains area around Katoomba he thought were really magnificent. Locally, our own Lake Macquarie created a profound impression with its many miles of beautiful shoreline.

However, Tom has taken back with him something to remember this country of ours by. Just prior to his leaving, the laboratory staff presented him with a volume of AUSTRALIA, by Frank Hurley. This beautifully reproduced photographic record of Australia will, we feel sure, be a prized memento of the time he spent here and in particular of the friendships made at Cockle Creek.
