I feel sure that these apprentices, junior office assistants and cadets will have done much to justify the confidence the Sulphide has shown in the high schools of our area.

## Mr. Blakemore and the High School Scholarships

With the emphasis on education in this "News" it was most appropriate that we should have a visit on 7th August from Mr. D. R. Blakemore first Principal of Booragul High School and one of the initiators of the company scholarship systems now well established in four local High Schools.

In January, 1961, approval was given by the Board of Sulphide Corporation for the establishment of two scholarships at Booragul High School to assist selected students to complete their senior studies and thus enable them to proceed to further education at the tertiary level.
