Works "Open Week"

Tours will be limited to groups of 8 - 10 people (maximum) and will be by appointment, leaving from the Main Gate area at 9.30 a.m., 10.00 a.m., 10.30 a.m., 1.30 p.m., 2.00 p.m. and 2.30 p.m., and will take approximately 2 hours. Bookings are to be made in the name of the employee concerned. The employee will be issued with a pass indicating number of persons, day, time, and safety requirements, in relation to the type of clothing to be worn, viz. slacks and solid shoes. Helmets and respirators will be issued at the beginning of the tour, to be returned on completion.

Depending on the amount of interest generated, it may be that these tours will become a regular part of our activities on, say, a weekly or twice weekly basis.

Sir Maurice Mawby Memorial

The Australasian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy has recently released its book Mining and Metallurgical Practices in Australasia. This prestigious volume, of some 950 pages was dedicated to the previous Chairman of CRA, Sir Maurice Mawby (1904 - 1977) in memory of his services to the mining and metallurgical industry in Australia.

Maurie Mawby, as he was better known, was one of the most memorable figures in the Australian mineral industry, and at the same time ranked highly on the international scene. Combining to a rare degree the qualities of wisdom, vision, dedication, optimism, and humanity, he spearheaded and guided a great segment of the upsurge in mineral discovery and development in Australia during the 1950's and 1960's.

The book is in reality a series of papers, or lectures, by people who are eminent in their own sphere of mining or metallurgical practice, and encompasses the whole spectrum of the recovery of metals from the earth.

Covering almost every metal commercially produced in Australia the book could be an ideal reference to all of these activities for people with a study project, particularly those intending to make a career in the field of mining, mineral, or metal extraction.

For this reason Sulphide has made presentations to the various institutions of learning and libraries within our region such as the University of Newcastle, Newcastle, Belmont, and Glendale Technical Colleges, local High Schools, viz. Booragul, Cardiff, Glendale, Toronto, and Warners Bay, Newcastle Region Library, and the Lake Macquarie Municipal Library.

Being placed in the libraries of these institutions ensures that the book is readily available as a reference to many of those in our community who may otherwise never have known of its existence.
