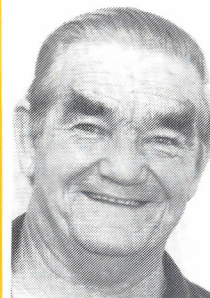

Let me stress the importance of receiving prompt attention to any injuries sustained. In particular our eyes must be properly protected and cared for.

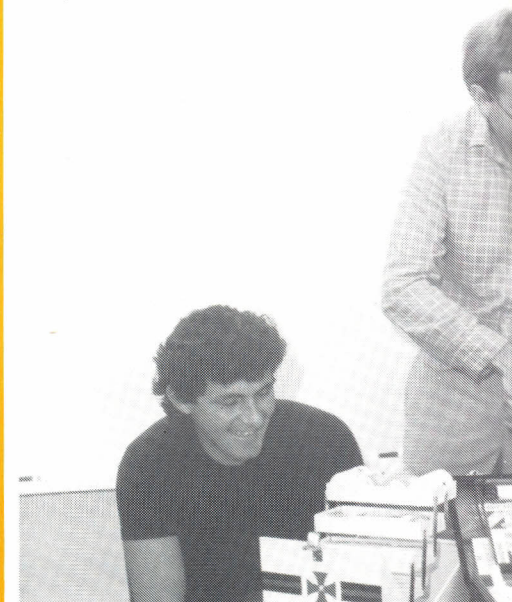
VISIT TO SYDNEY PLANT

The manufacturing plant of Protector/Sureguard was the scene of a visit by members of Sulphide's Occupational Health and Safety Committee. Two other groups had previously visited the factory.

On 6 May, Michael Nolan, Ray Boyce, Ken Cromie, Bill Smith, John Grew, Brian Jackaman and George Barnier travelled to Guildford in Sydney to inspect the plant where over 500 different safety products are manufactured and assembled.

'Many of the items used here at Sulphide were seen being produced and tested. These include dust respirators, safety glasses, hard hats and caps and full face breathing masks with power packs', Michael Nolan, Committee spokesman said.
